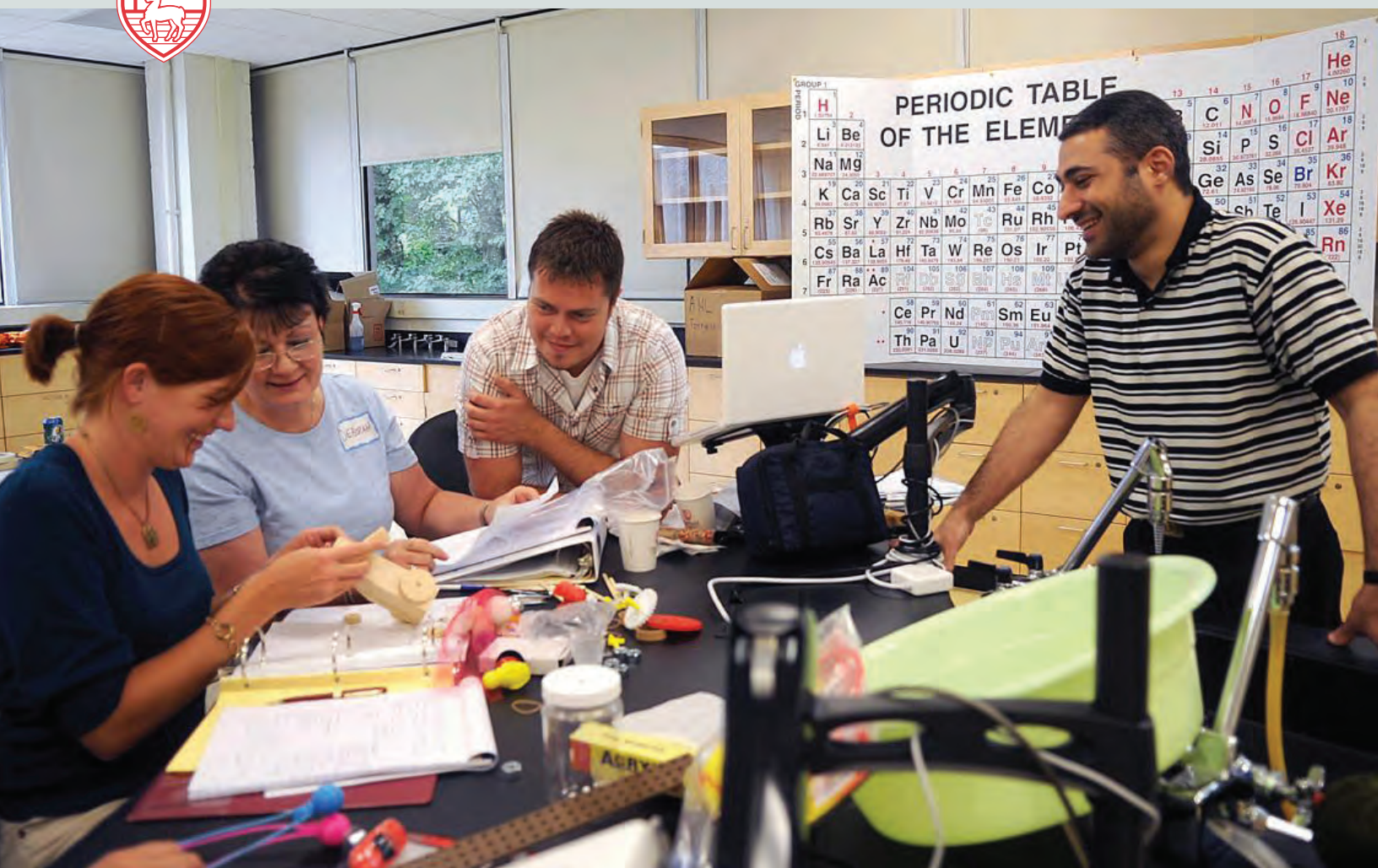

## New Students

New Non-matriculated Status Students should allow time for their applications to be entered into the University's registration database at the Dean's Office before registering for courses.

## Registration

**We encourage you to register early to get the courses you want. Low enrollment courses will be cancelled a week before the beginning of the relevant summer session. Students must be registered by the first day of the session.**

**Online and walk-in registration for matriculated students begins on April 1; registration for non-matriculated students must be done in person and begins on May 1.**

### Online

Online registration is only for formally matriculated students paying in full with a credit card. Instructions for registering online are available through your StagWeb account (select Academics tab, then Registration channel on left side of screen). **Non-matriculated students must register in person.**

### Walk-in

Walk-in registration is by money order, check, or credit card. Promissory notes are also available at the Registrar's Office only. Cash in amounts over \$100 cannot be accepted at the Registrar's Office; however, the Bursar's Office will accept and issue credit.

## Course Withdrawal/ Tuition Refunds

Official withdrawals from courses must be made in writing or in person at the Office of the Registrar, Kelley Center. Simply ceasing to attend classes is not considered withdrawal and will result in a failing grade and no tuition refund. Tuition refunds as the result of official withdrawal from coursework will be made by the Office of the Bursar according to the following schedule:

## Admission/Application Deadlines

Deadlines for applying for formal admission are posted on the website. Follow the links at [www.fairfield.edu/gseap](http://www.fairfield.edu/gseap).

**NOTE:** Qualified students may start their studies as a **non-matriculated status student** before being formally matriculated. Those who apply for non-matriculated status in a certification program may take a maximum of six (6) credits. Those who apply for non-matriculated status in a non-certification program may take a maximum of nine (9) credits. **Students must be formally admitted (matriculated) in order to continue enrollment past their non-matriculated student status.**

**For those seeking formal admission to a certification program, the Praxis I must be passed or waived BEFORE formal admission.**

## Fingerprinting & Criminal Background Check

Any student who will be doing school-based fieldwork, internships, observations, etc. during their program of study must be fingerprinted **before registering**. Ask your advisor or the Dean's Office for details.
