MASTER OF SCIENCE IN NURSING — FAMILY NURSE PRACTITIONER

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Family Nurse Practitioner program prepares advanced practice nurses to provide holistic care to individuals of all ages from newborn babies to older adults, and to address issues associated with women's health. Students work in all care settings with a focus on delivering patient care management, health promotion, and disease prevention to people with acute and chronic disease. Graduates diagnose, manage, and evaluate the care of patients, except in critical care settings. Students have clinical practice in nearby city and rural clinics, private practices, hospitals, and other settings that employ advanced practice nurses or MDs.

COURSE OF STUDY

The Master of Science in Nursing, Family Nurse Practitioner track, requires 51 credits of coursework, including 12 credits of practicum experience. Please see the School of Nursing Graduate Catalog or visit www.fairfield.edu/nursing for curriculum plans and course descriptions.

PRACTICA

Practica experiences in a variety of clinical settings in the surrounding communities allow students to bring theory and practice together, honing their clinical judgment and their assessment and diagnostic skills. Each student works closely with a faculty member to choose a clinical site; all practicum placements are individualized to meet the student's learning needs.

PROFESSIONAL PATHWAYS

Agencies hosting placement in the family nurse practitioner program include a variety of settings: area hospitals, community health centers, urgent care clinics, private practices, walk-in centers, school-based health centers, college health clinics, and long-term care facilities. Family Nurse Practitioner employers include the Bridgeport Public School Health Clinics, United Home Care, Yale-New Haven Hospital, and Southwest Community Health Center.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants for a master's degree must hold a baccalaureate degree in nursing from a regionally accredited college or university (or the international equivalent) with a quality point average of 3.0 or higher.

RN applicants who have a non-nursing bachelor's degree will be considered on an individual basis and may be required to complete select prerequisites to be eligible for admission to the MSN program.

FORMAL ADMISSION PROCESS

Please Note: Applications to this program will be accepted for Fall entry only. The application deadline is March 1.

Students seeking admission must complete and submit the following online:

1. A completed application.
(Apply online at [fairfield.edu/sonapp](http://www.fairfield.edu/sonapp).)
2. A non-refundable \$60 application fee.
3. A professional résumé.
4. A personal statement:
 - Discuss a practice problem in your field that, in your experience, has a broad impact on patient care outcomes.
 - State professional goals for the next 5-10 years.
 - Explain how the Family Nurse Practitioner program will help you reach your goals.
5. Official transcripts from all universities/colleges attended. All foreign transcripts must be evaluated by an approved evaluating service. A complete list of approved evaluators can be found at www.fairfield.edu/eval.
6. Two recommendations, one of which must be from a current supervisor or professor, accompanied by the University recommendation forms, completed online.
7. Copy of current RN license to practice in the state of Connecticut.
8. All international students whose native language is not English must demonstrate proficiency in the English language by taking either TOEFL or IELTS exams. For admission to the graduate school, a TOEFL composite score of 550 for the paper test, 213 for the computer-based test, 80 on the internet-based test or an IELTS score of 6.5 is strongly recommended. Scores must be sent directly from the Educational Testing Service (TOEFL) or www.IELTS.org. Fairfield's ETS code is 3390.

MANDATORY IMMUNIZATIONS

Connecticut State law requires each full-time or matriculated student to provide proof of immunity or screening against measles, mumps, rubella, varicella (chicken pox), meningitis and tuberculosis. Certain exemptions based on age and housing status apply. Matriculating students are defined as those enrolled in a degree seeking program. Although this is not required to complete an application, you must provide proof of immunity/screening prior to course registration.
